
ART





ANNUAL REPORT TO SCHOOL COMMUNITY & SCHOOL REVIEW REPORT

2022 Annual Report to the School Community

The Annual Report provides principals and school councils with an opportunity to share the year's achievements and progress with the school community. This includes reflecting on the school's performance and explaining the impact of school improvement efforts on student outcomes. Willowmavin PS's annual report has been endorsed by Andrew and School Council along with our Senior Education Improvement Leader (SEIL) and is now ready to be shared with the school community. School Review Report

The School Review Report has been finalised, approved by Andrew and our SEIL, presented at School Council and is now ready to be shared with the school community. It provides a summary of the panel's findings, including highlights, reflection on achievement of goals and identifies key directions for the next School Strategic Plan (SSP). The new SSP will be presented at the School Council meeting next week and then shared with the school community.

The panel identified four highlights (the maximum number allowed to be included in a review report):

- Creating a positive, supportive, respectful learning environment
- Establishing a consistent approach to teaching and learning in writing
- Developing processes to drive continuous improvement across the school
- Community connections

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RAISING RESILIENT CHILDREN



This week, Willowmavin PS hosted Anna from Triple P parenting. Anna facilitated a parent/carer seminar focusing on 'Raising Resilient Children'. The delivery of this program is supported by the Australian Government of Health and Aged Care under the Parenting Education and Support Program. There are free online programs available that you can complete at your own pace. Courses include:

- Fear-Less Triple P Online for parents/carers of children (6+) who are often anxious
- Triple P Online for parents/carers of children under 12

GRATITUDE and RESILIENCE

Our Professional Learning Community (PLC) work this term continues to focus on the links between gratitude and resilience.

One of the strategies we are trialling is to pause each day to identify something that went well. Research shows that by doing this, we can rewire our brains and become three times more likely to notice a positive. This message was reinforced during Anna's 'Raising Resilient Children' parent workshop this week.

Anna invited us to do an experiment. We were asked to scan the room for anything red and then return our attention to the front of the room. When Anna asked us to name red things in the room, we could rattle off plenty of examples. When Anna challenged us to name purple objects, we only had one example. The purpose behind the task was to highlight that you find what you look to find. So, if you are looking for positive things, chances are you will find them. If you are not looking for them, you may miss opportunities to notice positive parts of the day.

What are three things that <u>went well</u> for you today?

In only 21 days...

You rewire your brain to start scanning the world for the positive

You become 3 times more likely to notice a positive

...and in 42 days, you...



- are less likely to get sick
- have higher levels of energy
- feel happier
- are more enthusiastic
- are more focused
- are more determined
- are more optimistic
- have a better quality of sleep
- have lower levels of depression and anxiety
